Matthew 12:22-32, 43-45

Let us pray:

Lord, we thank you for the gift of your Word;

open our hearts and our minds to your Spirit as we reflect and pray. Amen.

Although I knew it was possible, I felt shocked on Tuesday when the Premier announced the reinstatement of Stage 3 lockdown over Melbourne for the next six weeks.

We are seeing and perhaps experiencing a lot of grief and anger in people's reactions. These emotions work themselves out by wanting to find someone or 'someones' to blame. The media loves to amplify this.

Last week I talked about gentleness.

Gentleness and its twin, patience, are virtues greatly in need in this current time.

Without them, we are the proverbial bull in the china shop, wreaking damage and destruction in our wake.

With that in mind, let us turn to today's gospel.

Reputations.

They can make or break a person.

Bad reputations, caused through malice, is a sin called slander which the Bible has many warnings about in both Testaments.

The ninth commandment is *You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour.*

It connects with the third commandment: *You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.*

If, there, God seeks to protect his own name from dishonour, this ninth commandment seeks to protect the good name of every person whose desire it is to receive such a gift.

In today's gospel following Jesus' healing of a demoniac, while the people present wonder whether Jesus is the Messiah, the Pharisees accuse him of being demonic, a servant of Beelzebul, another name for the devil.

They may believe Jesus is a con. That he has set up this scene with this person pretending to be a demoniac and then miraculously cured.

Why the labels? Are the Pharisees jealous? Or threatened by the people's admiration for Jesus?

Their slander, for that is what it is, is absurd.

Jesus points out how it makes no sense for Satan to cast out Satan.

Every kingdom divided against itself is laid waste, and no city or house divided against itself will stand.

These are images of civil war and internal strife which have a long history, past and present, of destruction.

While I want to watch the news to know what is going on in the world, particularly with this pandemic, I hate watching reports of people turning on one another whether it is over the wearing of masks, the issues pertaining to Black Lives Matter, political shots being fired, and the impatience and frustration of many who want things fixed now!

But even when good work is being done, slander will question the motives of the person, or in Jesus' case the source.

Jesus calls the Pharisees to think about what they are saying.
Among their number they have exorcists.
Do they question their ministry?

When I was reflecting on this text a few weeks ago, I thought more about how Christians and churches can be divided among themselves usually because each's vision of the kingdom is too small, it is only about me and my bit, and we end up dividing God's kingdom into various groups of us and them.

I wrote this prayer at the time:

Lord, deliver us from our stupidity when we attack ourselves because we are not generous of heart, but rather jealous, competitive and fearful. Help us repent from our divisive behaviour. For Jesus' sake. Amen.

Another theme I have explored lately is that of the 'little ones', the marginalized and the outcast that the Pharisees want nothing to do with.

They are happy to label them as demoniacs and leave them in their pit.

A more merciful view, such as Jesus', realises the demoniacs are helpless instruments of Satan.

It takes a stronger one than Satan to enter his house, bind him and free his prisoners.

Jesus is that stronger one, strong in his gentleness and patience.

As I quoted from Francis de Sales last week: ***Nothing is so strong as gentleness, nothing is so gentle as real strength*** – that is the real strength we need today.

What does Jesus mean when he says:

Whoever speaks against the Son of Man will be forgiven, but whoever speaks against the Holy Spirit will not be forgiven ...

The Pharisees' accusation of Jesus using the power of Beelzebul is perhaps the example of the latter, but the first part of his sentence sounds like Jesus himself can wear the accusations, and he will on the cross, but perhaps here he is defending those whom the Spirit of God works through and are unrecognised or even reviled.

As earlier illustrations showed, we humans are so good at destroying one another, even within the church. This whole passage could be a lesson for us.

Henri Nouwen nailed it when he wrote regarding human competitiveness, ***because that church is good, that means we aren't***. Those who want their church to emulate another but cannot accept who or what they are, are in fact blaspheming themselves?

Jesus talks about careless words, don't we have a lot of them? By our words we are justified, and by our words we are condemned. Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks. If there is good treasure therein, good will come out.

The last section on the unclean and evil spirit is confronting.

To think that such a spirit can be exorcised, to only come back indwell the same person multiplying the evil seven times.

The image of a house swept and clean – but empty – is an invitation for squatters or open to another infestation.

This image suggests there is no neutral spiritual place.

In this same chapter Jesus has pointed out that as a tree, your fruit will be either good or poor, for eating or discarding.

If there is this divide, I guess because we are human we often jump from one side to the other, but where do we start lingering?

Healing perhaps can be compared to successfully losing weight, or gaining a degree of fitness or any other improvement in life.

But we know in our experience that if we do not build on it from there, we lose the benefits.

Use it or lose it is a pithy truism.

So too I think, our spiritual healing and insights need to be recognised for the treasure they are and nurtured in our hearts.

Let us pray that we may not be blind or deaf to the work of the Holy Spirit in ourselves, in another, in another church or our church, or out in the world.

May the words of our mouth be of the Spirit's good and abundant treasure which gives life to all. Amen.

INTERCESSIONS BY REV SUE BROOKS

Abundant and loving God, use our senses to open our hearts and minds to the richness of scriptures. Help us to receive the gifts you sow so graciously and freely in our lives, and inspire us to share such bounty generously with our neighbours.

May they receive care and love from you and from us as well.

We pray too for those in Victoria who are victims of this terrible disease, for the many, many who have been placed in lockdown, for those who are now in hospital and those who are trying to recover from this virus.

We pray that they may know patience and kindness with all they meet,

May they also know that these actions are for the betterment of all.

We pray for those who are enforcing these lockdowns that they may also know patience and kindness too.

Lord, in your mercy, *hear our prayer.*

We pray for those who are part of this church community and in the whole Christian Church, those with whom we are drawn together by a common faith and uncommon grace

We pray for the many people in churches who have been affected by this disruptive time, the groups who are now not able to meet, and those who are lonely and alone. May they know that we love them are praying for each of them.

May we thrive in ministry, may we expand in mission may we deepen in spirituality, and may we grow closer to one another and you.
