PART 1 - OPENING PRAYERS

WELCOME

READINGS Romans 8:31-39 Psalm 85:8-13 Matthew 13:31-35, 44-53

SERMON BY REV JENNIE SAVAGE

Matthew 13: 31-35, 44-53

Let us pray: Lord, we thank you for the gift of your Word; open our hearts and our minds to your Spirit as we reflect and pray. Amen.

Let's have a quick review of this assortment of parables about the kingdom of heaven, from the start of Matthew 13:

- 1. There's the sower, who sows the word of the kingdom meeting with various receptions, but where there is good soil, the bearing of fruit is magnificent.
- 2. Then there is the story of the good seed of the wheat which gets caught up with the weeds growing in its midst and unable to be separated until the harvest time where the difference becomes obvious.
- 3. There are the parables of the mustard seed and the yeast, indicating the kingdom may start in what seems small and insignificant ways, and yet becomes incredibly significant in its work.
- 4. And in today's reading we heard three pithy parables. The first two compared discovering the kingdom as a great treasure, one hidden in a field, the other finding the pearl of great value. Both of these are worth everything in order to possess.
- 5. Then they are followed by the parable of the dragnet. The kingdom catches fish of every kind that are later sorted out, separated, the bad fish from the good, separating the evil from the righteous.

There's a lot about separation, about telling the difference between the good and the bad. Sometimes it all seems just too hard work, even dirty work – as in, you get your hands dirty. For all today's talk about pearls and treasure, they don't simply fall in your lap.

For instance, there is the treasure that is hidden in a field. Someone found it, then hid it again until he was able to get enough funds, which meant selling all that he had, so he could buy the field and claim his treasure. The merchant's discovery also demanded of him the liquidation of all his assets and previous discoveries before he could own the great pearl.

This suggests the kingdom of heaven comes at quite a cost! But first we have to recognize its value, so, back to that review:

The seed which grew in the good soil yielded 30, 60, even a hundredfold in grain. The wheat which grew entangled in the weeds, at harvest time proved its worth. The mustard seed grew into a tree providing housing for the birds of the air. The yeast was able to leaven three measures of flour.

In one sense they are very simple things, yet they are profound. Not being an agrarian culture, maybe these parables don't find us an easy target. We tend to be dazzled by big cars and houses and exotic travel.

Plants, food? Easily available until a pandemic comes along. Suddenly staples are in short supply as were seedlings – now was that because of a desire to become self-sufficient, or a home project?

But in the past we have also have known the word 'drought', when soil became too dry and too dusty to grow the crops, or grass for the cattle.

Sometimes we are shaken out of our complacency.

We take for granted having a place to call home.

How will our children or grandchildren be able to afford their own accommodation? Perhaps our families are the lucky ones, but what of the many unlucky ones? What of the many, who because of this pandemic, are going to lose their homes in the economic fallout? I have known a number who thought such a thing would never happen to them.

This pandemic has shaken up the world.

Many things that had the fancy price tag are now redundant. Much that was undervalued, has shown its true worth. They have a new name: the essentials.

They are priceless, beyond a price tag, we cannot do without them. But now the world is in a dilemma in trying to save the economy our society has been built on. What should be put first?

Morally, can the economy return to what it was before this pandemic? What have we learnt about true value?

As I look at those little parables again, I wonder how I can enjoy the value of the kingdom whilst holding defensively to other things that prop up my life.

I start to wonder, what do I have to divest myself of in order to enjoy the benefits of the kingdom? For it seems it is not only my accumulation of other worldly goods, but also what lies beneath that accumulation: fear, defensiveness, self-protection.

What am I really investing in?

What is our society investing in?

The kingdom of heaven asks of us values of humility and detachment. These virtues give freedom that allow other things to be found and to grow.

But we can only obtain this freedom by shaking off some other chains first.

The laborer and the merchant had to go off and do their homework first. The language of separation, of telling the difference is underneath these parables too. So Jesus rounds off this series with yet another parable of sorting, the dragnet with all its kinds of fish.

As we look over this chapter in Matthew, we see the promises of the kingdom. The promises of goodness, fruitfulness, hospitality, and joy! But how entangled we are by the weeds, how overwhelmed we are.

The promises of the kingdom of heaven may seem small and insignificant against all that is around us, but they do their work. The kingdom is worth the work of sifting the soil, being aware of the weeds, sowing a small seed, letting a bit of yeast start its work. The kingdom is worth detaching from and, or, divesting yourself of other demands. The kingdom bursts beyond our isolation and our own minds. The kingdom is to be grown here on earth as it is in heaven.

In the end, these parables turn around as they show God's activity here on earth: sowing the seed, patiently outwaiting the weeds, inserting a bit of leaven, treasuring the world so much that God bursts through to the world in Jesus Christ, giving up everything, even life on a cross to bring about the kingdom where we are God's beloved, priceless, possession.

I finish with this creed based on these parables. The creed was written by Rev Bruce Prewer. Let this be our prayer:

We believe in the love-kingdom of God, through Christ upon us, within us, beyond us.

We believe the love-kingdom is like a mustard seed; sown in apparent insignificance, growing into magnificence for the greening of the world.

We believe the love-kingdom is like yeast; inserted in humble insignificance into the dough of life, expanding into enough bread for the world.

We believe the love-kingdom of God is like a treasure; lost and rendered insignificant the ground, now found with joy and thanksgiving.

We believe the love-kingdom of God is like pearls; all others become in insignificant the largest, most beautiful pearl of all is found.

We believe the love-kingdom of God is like a net full of fish; where even insignificant are saved but wormridden barracouta are thrown away.

We believe in the love-kingdom of God, through Christ upon us, within us, beyond us; where the meek and the poor, the merciful and the hungry, rejoice with the angels of God. Loving God, we believe; scatter our unbelief. Amen.
