SERMON BY REV JENNIE SAVAGE

Matthew 16:1-12

Let us pray:

Lord, we thank you for the gift of your Word; open our hearts and our minds to your Spirit as we reflect and pray. Amen.

Earlier in the year, Sav and I walked up Arthurs Seat from the bottom of the hill and ended up at The Eagle Café eager for a reward of coffee and cake. I do love cake, though I it is better I not eat it too often. At The Eagle I peered into the display fridge with delicious anticipation, *which one would I have?*

Having made my decision I went to the cashier to order and was told it was self-serve, to go and get the cake out myself. Sav pointed out the 'self-serve' sign that was right in front of the display that somehow, I completely missed as I zero-ed in on the cakes themselves!

Well, I'm not the only one who does not see what is right in front of their eyes! What we look for, though, is not always right there in front. Sometimes we truly have to search, make an effort to find not only an object or a person, but also truth and meaning.

In today's text from the gospel, the Pharisees and the Sadducees come and asked Jesus for a sign from heaven. Apparently, they are testing him. It never goes down very well when people demand a sign in the Bible. While some do demand God provide proof by means of a sign, God asks human beings to step out in faith.

The scene before this text is a three day walk out pass the Sea of Galilee and up a mountain. What is interesting about this scene, apart from the feeding of four thousand men plus women and children (and yes, that is pretty interesting in itself), is that those 4,000 plus people, the crowds, followed Jesus all the way out there.

Remember me saying before about needing to search, make an effort to find what we are looking for? And I think they found it. During those three days on that mountain with Jesus, many were healed, all were fed from seven loaves and a few fish, and the people praised the God of Israel.

And *then* back in the town, the Pharisees and the Sadducees come and asked Jesus for a sign from heaven! It is sort of laughable. They have no idea, because of course they would not get up and follow Jesus for three days.

Is this their fault? Perhaps they had commitments?

Jesus challenges them on interpreting the signs of the times. *An evil and adulterous generation asks for a sign, but no sign will be given to it except the sign of Jonah.* What does that mean?

Very simply, Jonah was sent to Ninevah by God to tell them to repent, to turn to God because their ways were evil.

That's it in a nutshell. Repent! Turn to God!

The signs of the times always call us to turn to God. Turn to God in joy. Turn to God in times of trouble.

The signs of today: pandemic, divisions, protests, natural catastrophes, injustice and other evils ... There is plenty of troubles for us to turn to God, repent, and humbly ask for deliverance. There is much in our world that is wrong. We cannot deny it.

In Nineveh it was business as usual until Jonah's message was heard. Our business has been rudely interrupted by this pandemic and on top of it plenty of other issues and calamities. Are they not signs to turn to God and to pray?

Jesus left them (The Pharisees and Sadducees) and went away. The signs have been done, they either heed them or go on their own way of destruction. Trouble is, their ways of destruction do not only affect them but others, and Jesus warns his disciples: **Watch out, and beware of the yeast of the Pharisees and Sadducees.**

I feel a bit sorry for the disciples here as they get confused. In recent days Jesus has *twice(!)* fed thousands with very little bread, **their bread!** Bread has yeast, therefore Jesus must be planning another feast and they forgot to bring any at all!

Jesus is talking about that in one sense, he is talking about them as signs they have been privileged to behold, but watch out, the Pharisees and Sadducees will be sowing doubt in people's minds as they cannot abide Jesus' popularity with people.

Earlier in the gospel, Jesus used the image of yeast for the work of the kingdom of heaven: a small amount of yeast miraculously leavens several measures of flour. But now he refers to yeast as a negative metaphor, like the worm that makes the apple bad. Yeast or leaven, in Judaism, came to be a symbol for making bread less pure. This interpretation came from their major feast of the Passover when all leaven has to be cleared out of the house. The special Passover meal commemorates the time when the people of Israel left Egypt in such a hurry that there was not time to bake leavened bread, so they ate it unleavened. That was their night of deliverance.

Jesus' disciples realise they are being told to beware of the teaching of the Pharisees and Sadducees. What is this teaching? I don't think it is about heresy, as in theological arguments or theories. It is more likely an accommodation to evil, something more subtle which entangles and ensnares. As religious authorities in those times, the Pharisees and Sadducees were extremely compromised with the set up of the Roman Empire. Jesus was a threat to them as he and his teaching threatened to upset the proverbial applecart. Accommodation to Rome meant playing it safe.

C.S. Lewis' *Screwtape Letters* is a masterpiece in explaining the evil of accommodation to worldly powers rather than God. Such accommodation leads to a fall into false comfort that says, ***it really doesn't matter, or we can't do anything about it.*** So, we shun rigorous commitment and allow ourselves to become diluted. How then, do we remain rigorous?

The importance and rigour of prayer is something, especially at this time, to turn to. In prayer may we take the time and distance in following Jesus and to recognise the true signs of the kingdom of heaven, of where God is working in our midst.

And may our minds be sharpened in prayer to tell the difference, in our moral and spiritual life together, between the signs we must observe and those we would do better to ignore.

Let us pray

O Lord,

Help us not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that knowing your will our whole lives may become a sacrifice of praise, holy and acceptable to you. Amen.
