Leviticus 19:1-2, 15-18

Psalm 1

Matthew 22:34-46

Leviticus 19:1-2, 15-18

*Let us pray:*

*Lord, we thank you for the gift of your Word and as we think on the matters raised, open our hearts and our minds to hear you. Amen.*

**Holiness**

Have you ever been called ‘holier than thou’?

It is not usually meant as a compliment.

The implication is that you consider yourself more righteous than others and come across as arrogant and condescending.

When God, through Moses, addressed the people of Israel and commanded them:

***You shall be holy, for I the Lord your God am holy***

he certainly did not mean them to antagonise others by their attitude.

Rather, their holiness would be a witness, a light, and would play out in their daily way of life.

First, though, what does **holy** mean?

Literally it means to be set apart, for a purpose.

For something to be made sacred means it has a special and meaningful use as opposed to a common one. In church there are many items we consider sacred for their special use, like the vessels and materials used in Communion and worship.

In other faiths and spiritualities there are similar ideas of not only things, but places and people who are sacred and holy.

Leviticus 19 has been called the highest development of ethics in the Old Testament. Apparently, Leviticus records more words from the mouth of God than any other book of the Bible. This chapter perhaps better than any other in the Bible, explains what it meant for Israel to be a holy nation. And interestingly it goes straight into how holy people treat others.

The call to be holy is not for a few, not restricted to leaders like to Moses, or the priests but applies to the whole people of Israel. It is the same here, you, the whole congregation, is called to be holy.

In this telling of the moral law, the people’s life with God and with one another **is** the practical expression of their holiness. We are to be shaped by the one whom we worship. The behaviour that is exhorted is accompanied by the refrain: ***I am the Lord.***

It is the Lord to whom we are accountable.

Verses 15-18 exhort in the negative: how **not** to treat your neighbour. Holiness is practiced in the everyday routines and duties and connections. You are holy when you do not gossip or slander or hold a grudge. You are holy when you are fair to everyone equally, without being influenced by either pity or greed.

And this section ends with what we know as the second great commandment: ***you shall love your neighbour as yourself.***

You might be surprised to hear that it is only once in the Old Testament do we find the explicit commandment ***you shall love your neighbour as yourself*** – here in Leviticus. Who are these neighbours that we are called to love? It is said that charity, which is an act of love, begins at home, but it certainly does not end there, nor with our close friends, neighbours or community.

Later in Leviticus 19, verse 34, we find the exhortation again, but this time it says: ***you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt.***

This commandment to love the alien, or the stranger is found in 37 times in the Old Testament. The stranger stands for refugees, exiles, foreigners – anyone in an alien country with no civil rights.\* Why does this come up so often?

The time of Israel's slavery in Egypt was the darkest time in their history. It took a long time for them to escape, even with God's help, and a longer time to put it behind them. God charges them though to not forget it. While things are much better for them, they are in a position to be kind and show compassion to others who are suffering as they once did.

### ***Who is my neighbour?***

So, to love my neighbour casts a very wide net.

Jesus treats this most directly in the parable of the Good Samaritan when asked ***who is my neighbour?*** (Luke 10:25-37) He also addresses it in his sermon on the mount when he calls his disciples to love their enemy. (Matthew 5:44) To love one another within our families and communities is our daily practice that conforms us to Christ.

The early church was unusual in its diverse mix, as Colossians 3:11 showed, ***there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free, but Christ is all and in all.***

A diverse community that practices love among all becomes a witness to the glory of God.

In itself it was enough for people to remark of the early church: ***look at how the Christians love one another!***

Jesus said, ***By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.*** (John 13:35)

And like the Triune God, this love breaks all barriers and extends outward and beyond.

### ***Reproving***

***Holier than thou*** manifested as self-righteousness is not how we want to come across to other people. An awkward part in this text is in our love for our neighbour, we are not to refrain from reproving them. Who wants to do that? It is easier to look the other way, to just not want to know. Sometimes it is hard to know who or what is exactly right.

Who wants to be reproved themselves? Perhaps that is where we start. Accountability is a pressure, but it also has results. Try giving up smoking, losing weight, keeping a health regime – if we are reporting to someone, we are more mindful of sticking to it, getting the job done. So, there are time we willingly make ourselves accountable. So, maybe we should be more willing to be spiritually accountable ourselves, prior to holding others to account?

***Forgive us our sins, as we forgive those who sin against us.***

***You shall love your neighbour as yourself.***

It seems to be that way round.

As much as we need and receive forgiveness and love, we recognise that others, known and unknown to us, do as well.

***Let us pray.***

***Teach us to love, Lord,  
as you have loved us  
that this world might be  
a better neighbourhood  
in which to live and share.  
Bless the paths that cross today;  
the old friends and strangers  
with whom we might share***

***a pleasant greeting, a smile  
or maybe something deeper.  
Grant us a word in season  
that might resonate within  
and bring a blessing to these,  
your precious children, in Jesus' name we pray.  
Amen.
